Safety in the garden

Points to remember when gardening with children:

- 1. Avoid using potentially harmful plants in the garden. These include plants with attractive but poisonous fruit, plants with irritant or toxic sap, and plants with sharp foliage or spines. For a list of potentially harmful plants see RHS Advisory Leaflet "Take Care, Be Aware"
- 2. Keep dangerous tools and machinery in a locked shed. Instruct children in how to handle gardening tools safely, such as walking with pointed ends down and not leaving garden rakes with the prongs upwards. Use cane toppers to prevent damage to eyes Keep garden fertilisers and chemicals in a locked cupboard or shed and make children aware of the danger
- 3. Encourage good hygiene by getting children to wash their hands after gardening and before eating. Getting children used to wearing gloves when gardening will help protect them from harmful diseases in the soil. Ensure tetanus jabs are up to date. If possible, keep dogs and cats from fouling in the garden
- 4. In hot weather take care that children have sufficient sun protection and drink regularly. In cold weather be sure that children have sufficient clothing to keep warm
- 5. Provide soft surfaces such as bark chips or synthetic mats (see under suppliers for Technix Rubber and Plastics Ltd.) beneath areas where children may fall, such as swings and climbing frames
- 6. Ponds and swimming pools are a major hazard in gardens where children play and children should be supervised at all times. Where possible, fence off a pond or cover it with a solid metal grid (see under suppliers for Safapond Ltd.). Empty out paddling pools when not in use. Consider filling in small ponds while children are young. Using the pond as a sand-pit or decking area is a good idea and means the pond can be refilled when the children are older. Safe water features include rills, pebble fountains and wall-mounted fountains.
